Guidelines

The overall goal of the Human Rights & Business Roundtable is to promote the rule of law and open societies. To do this we have a common set of principles and have a sustained dialogue over issues of common cause and common concern. Members and guests of the Roundtable must be able to speak openly, frankly and in confidence in order to identify ways to work cooperatively together in the future to address issues concerning human rights. Therefore, Roundtable is guided by a few ground rules:

The Roundtable is based on confidentiality, trust, and mutual respect

The Roundtable operates under the Chatham House Rule. There is to be no attribution to individuals or their organizations of what was said. When we do reports, only formal presenters will be attributed and only broad themes of the discussion are highlighted.

Also, participants may have been invited because of their position and affiliation, but during the Roundtable views expressed by participants represent only their personal views and do not reflect upon their company or organization, unless otherwise stated by the individual.

Everything discussed at the Roundtable is voluntary – for example any proposals brought forth here are not mandatory in any way. And, moreover, any issue that is in litigation will not be discussed. No party to litigation that involves the companies, organizations and/or projects participate in Roundtable Plenary Sessions that relate to such litigation.

These guidelines will help us find ways to work together in specific countries and projects, as well as in general, to promote the rule of law and open societies.

Further, we politely request that no marketing or explicit business development activities take place at the Roundtable. We welcome increased linkages within our community, but ask that the Roundtable remain non-commercial in nature.

As a participant of the Roundtable, you are assumed to have accepted these guidelines. It is the respect demonstrated by Roundtable participants toward other participants that has made the Roundtable so successful for nearly two decades. Violations of these guidelines, particularly to the confidentiality of the discussions and the spirit of trust among participants, are taken very seriously.
